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**Editor's Note:** If anyone doubts emergency management is a growth industry, the past few weeks in Region II will disabuse them. Region II personnel have been sent to the Gulf Coast, Ethiopia, and are held-up in 26 Federal Plaza, fielding calls from across the country. This issue will look at Region II's wide impact.

## REGION II AND THE WORLD

Join the Navy and see the world.

For years, that was the recruitment slogan of the US Navy. Terra Flynn remembers. He spent 22 years in the US Navy, as a member of their elite Sea, Air and Land (SEAL) unit. During that period, he was deployed in 52 foreign countries, and now that he is Region II's Preparedness Analyst and Planning Officer for the National Preparedness Division, he is will up that total to 53.

Next week, Terra will be deployed for three weeks in Ethiopia, part of a federal team funded by US AID and lead by the US Department of Agriculture Forest Service (USFS), to help the Government of Ethiopia strengthen its public sector capacity for disaster management.

Ethiopia is highly vulnerable to disasters; major hazards include drought, flood, forest fire, human and livestock diseases and crop pests. Hunger and famine due to drought and civil conflict have had catastrophic consequences in the county, not only in terms of human suffering but also for political stability.

In an effort to change this scenario, the Government of Ethiopia has embarked on a "redirected" approach to disaster management, embracing a holistic, multi-hazard, decentralized strategy and tactics. Instead of reacting after the fact with disaster relief, an invigorated public sector may be able to manage and thereby

mitigate future disasters. Terra is FEMA's man on ground, selected for both his preparedness and SEALrelated skills. "The eastern part of the country borders Somalia, so that's

where the



SEAL background comes in, but what I'm really looking forward to is helping set up an emergency management infrastructure there. That, and seeing some wildlife."

As far as Fed Travel is concerned, **Bernie Preisser is The Man.** 

Since the new, automatic travel system began Beta Testing in Regions II and Region X last March, Region's II's Financial Management Specialist has become

the 'go-to guy' for questions. Region X was the

first to call in at the end of Week 1. Something about a group travel...The Hewlett Packard people are still working on that.

In fact, Bernie is on the phone with Hewlett Packard a couple of times a week, reporting glitches and working with their technical staff to come up with ways to refine and improve the system.

Although early users may have their own opinion, Fed Travel is actually an enormous data base that has to be input into servers at HQ. Everyone – except DAEs – gets a unique ID number and approval chain, as well as a job description. "Technically that's a big job in itself, so you have to expect some glitches," Bernie says. (The target date for adding DAEs is October 2010, Bernie advises.)

And there have been glitches. Bernie estimates he spends a couple of hours each day answering questions, both from Region II staff and whoever else is having problems, since all 10 FEMA regions are now using Fed Travel. "As Region II was among the first users, my role just evolved. And I actually enjoy finding ways to make it work better," Bernie says.

Nine weeks into FedTraveler, Bernie has developed a strategy for sidestepping problems. "You always need to create a Travel Authorization (TA) in FedTraveler before you travel, but you can save time by making care rental and hotel reservations by telephone *first*, and then enter that data in the online form." However, flights are best booked through FedTraveler while setting up the TA, Bernie advises.

The Man has outsmarted the computer.

**Tim Crowley** is the Region II's new Director of the Mitigation. He will oversees all disaster mitigation efforts, from the development and publication of new flood maps to grants designed to help communities curtail the effects of future disasters. He is an engineer and a lawyer.

Prior to joining Region II, Crowley served as a Deputy Attorney General and Counsel to the New Jersey Office of Homeland Security & Preparedness, the state's Domestic Security Preparedness Task Force and the New Jersey Office of Emergency Management. He was also a Senior Policy Advisor to the Attorney General and Director of the Office of Homeland Security & Preparedness on homeland security issues, with an emphasis on port security. Crowley served over 15 years in the New Jersey Attorney General's Office.

Crowley has served over 29 years in the US Coast Guard, holding the rank of Captain and is currently the Deputy Chief of Staff and Senior Reserve Officer for the Ninth Coast Guard District, which is responsible for the entire Great Lakes Region. He was on active duty from 1980-1990.

After the events of Sept, 11, 2001, Crowley was activated and served in several homeland security positions as a senior liaison, including the Coast Guard Liaison to the Mayor of New York City and NYC Office of Emergency Management; the National Military Command Center at the Pentagon; and most recently as a Core Member of the US Department of Homeland's Presidential Transition Team.

Crowley began his civil service as a federal prosecutor with the US Department of Justice, Antitrust Division, followed by a stint in private practice with a law firm in Philadelphia that specialized in admiralty law. Crowley is a graduate of the United States Merchant Marine Academy at Kings Point, NY. He received his law degree from the Rutgers University School of Law. He is also a graduate of the DHS/Naval Post Graduate School's Homeland Security Executive Leaders Program.
