

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# FY 2014 Timeline



**\*Maximum Timeframes per Appropriations Law:**

- Applications made available not later than 60 days after enactment of appropriations
- Submission of applications not later than 80 days after grant announcement
- The Administrator of FEMA shall act (announce awards) within 65 days after receipt of applications



# FY 2014 Risk Methodology

FEMA utilizes a comprehensive risk methodology to determine the eligibility and target allocations for the State Homeland Security Program (SHSP) and the Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI). In addition, the Port Security Grant Program (PSGP), Transit Security Grant Program (TSGP), and Operation Stonegarden (OPSG) use elements of risk, in conjunction with Transportation Security Agency (TSA), U.S. Coast Guard (USCG), and Customs and Border Protection (CBP) analysis, to determine eligibility and funding amounts.

- There are no structural changes to the risk formula and methodologies in FY 2014. However, the data in the SHSP and UASI border index has been enhanced:
  - The border index now includes air and water crossings, in addition to the existing land border crossings.
  
- All data has been refreshed to reflect the most current data available.
  
- The FY 2014 risk validation process for SHSP and UASI took place in February 2014.
  - The risk validation process is mandated by the *Homeland Security Act of 2002, as amended*.
  - FEMA heard from over 45 States and Urban Areas during the process.
  - FEMA also conducted two risk webinars to provide training regarding the risk validation process – over 180 individuals participated in the webinars.



# Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP) Priorities

- Building on FY 2013, grantees are required to align HSGP funding to support the implementation of the National Preparedness System by building and sustaining the 31 core capabilities across the five mission areas outlined in the National Preparedness Goal (NPG): Prevention, Protection, Mitigation, Response, and Recovery.
- HSGP prioritizes grant funding based on the capability targets and gaps identified through the annual Threat and Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA) and State Preparedness Report (SPR) process, with emphasis on whole community preparedness.
- Grantees are expected to consider national areas for improvement identified in the 2013 National Preparedness Report:
  - Cybersecurity, recovery-focused core capabilities, the integration of individuals with access and functional needs, enhancing the resilience of infrastructure systems, and maturing the role of public-private partnerships.
- Grantees are encouraged to build and sustain core capabilities through investments in planning activities, organizational resources, equipment, training, and exercises.
- Reporting requirements for HSGP have been reduced, streamlined, and consolidated to better align to the National Preparedness System.



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
