

After reviewing our Natural Heritage maps and files, I find the Division of Natural Areas and Preserves has no records of rare or endangered species in the North Lewisburg Storm Shelter/Community Support Center project area, including a one mile radius, on East St. in Champaign County, Ohio, and on the North Lewisburg Quad (FEMA PDMC-PJ-05-OH-2007-003).

There are no state nature preserves or scenic rivers at the project site. We are also unaware of any unique ecological sites, geologic features, animal assemblages, state parks, state forests or state wildlife areas within a one mile radius of the project area.

Our inventory program has not completely surveyed Ohio and relies on information supplied by many individuals and organizations. Therefore, a lack of records for any particular area is not a statement that rare species or unique features are absent from that area. ODNR COMMENTS TO Nancy J. Stavish, URS, Thresher Square, 700 Third Street South, Suite 600, Minneapolis, Minnesota 55415.

Location: The site is located 0.22 miles northeast of the junction of State Route 559 and State Route 245, Rush Township, Champaign County, North Lewisburg Quadrangle.

Project: The proposed project involves the construction of a 40' x 60' storm shelter/community support center to be located within the Village limits on property owned by the Village.

The Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) has completed a review of the above referenced project. These comments were generated by an inter-disciplinary review within the Department. These comments have been prepared under the authority of the Fish and Wildlife Coordination Act (48 Stat. 401, as amended; 16 U.S.C. 661 et seq.), the National Environmental Policy Act, the Coastal Zone Management Act, Ohio Revised Code and other applicable laws and regulations. These comments are also based on ODNR's experience as the state natural resource management agency and do not supersede or replace the regulatory authority of any local, state or federal agency nor relieve the applicant of the obligation to comply with any local, state or federal laws or regulations.

Rare and Endangered Species: The ODNR, Division of Natural Areas and Preserves, Natural Heritage Database contains no records of rare species or unique natural features within the proposed project and there are no state nature preserves, state parks, wildlife areas, or scenic rivers in the vicinity of the site. Our inventory program has not completely surveyed Ohio and relies on information supplied by many individuals and organizations. Therefore, a lack of records for any particular area is not a statement that rare species or unique features are absent from that area.

Fish and Wildlife: The ODNR, Division of Wildlife (DOW) has the following comments. The project is within the range of the Indiana bat (*Myotis sodalis*), a state and federally endangered species. The following species of trees have relatively high value as potential Indiana bat roost trees: Shagbark hickory (*Carya ovata*), Shellbark hickory (*Carya laciniosa*), Bitternut hickory (*Carya cordiformis*), Black ash (*Fraxinus nigra*), Green ash (*Fraxinus pennsylvanica*), White ash (*Fraxinus americana*), Shingle oak (*Quercus imbricaria*), Northern red oak (*Quercus rubra*), Slippery elm (*Ulmus rubra*), American elm (*Ulmus americana*), Eastern cottonwood (*Populus deltoides*), Silver maple (*Acer saccharinum*), Sassafras (*Sassafras albidum*), Post oak (*Quercus stellata*), and White oak (*Quercus alba*). Indiana bat habitat consists of suitable trees that include dead and dying trees of the species listed above with exfoliating bark, crevices, or cavities in upland areas or riparian corridors and living trees of the species listed above with exfoliating bark, cavities, or hollow areas formed from broken branches or tops. If suitable trees occur within the project area, these trees must be conserved. If suitable habitat occurs on the project area and trees must be cut, cutting must occur between September 30 and April 1. If suitable trees must be cut during the summer months of April 2 to September 29, a net survey must be conducted in May or June prior to cutting. If no tree removal is proposed, the project is not likely to impact this species.

The project is within a county where current records exist for the Eastern massasauga (*Sistrurus catenatus*), a state endangered and a Federal candidate snake species. Due to the location of the project, the current land use of the project area, and the type of project proposed, the DOW believes the project is not likely to impact this species.

The project is within the range of the clubshell (*Pleurobema clava*), a state and federally endangered mussel, the rayed bean (*Villosa fabalis*), a state endangered and federal candidate mussel species, and the snuffbox (*Epioblasma triquetra*), a state endangered mussel. Since there is no in-water work proposed, the DOW believes the project is not likely to impact these species.

The project is within the range of the elfin skimmer (*Nannothemis bella*), a state endangered dragonfly, and the seepage dancer (*Argia bipunctulata*), a state endangered damselfly. Due to the mobility of these species, the project is not likely to impact these species.

The project is within the range of the black bear (*Ursus americanus*), a state endangered species. Due to the mobility of this species, the project is not likely to have an impact on this species.

Geological Survey: The ODNR, Division of Geological Survey has the following comments.

Soil type at the site is of somewhat poor drainage which can cause limitations when constructing parking lots. The slope of the surface (2-6%) must also be taken into account when planning parking lot drainage. Soil on the project site has a high susceptibility to frost action and a water table that is very high (0-1 ft. from surface). Also, the shrink-swell potential and the potential to corrode steel are both high.

Bedrock at the location is composed of dolomite, anhydrite, gypsum, salt, and shale. The depth at which bedrock occurs is approximately 25 ft. at the project site.


The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) is proposing to provide funding to the Village of North Lewisburg in Champaign County for the construction of a Community Support Center / Storm Shelter. The purpose of this facility is to provide a safe haven for the residences of North Lewisburg and the surrounding area in the event of severe weather. Funding for this project will be through FEMA's Pre-Disaster Mitigation (PDM) Program and is authorized under Part 203 Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act (Stafford Act), 42 USC 5113, as amended.

The purpose of FEMA's Pre-Disaster Mitigation program is to provide Federal funding to states, territories, Indian tribal governments, communities, and universities for pre-disaster hazard mitigation planning and project implementation to reduce overall risks to the population and structures, while also reducing reliance on funding from actual disaster declarations. FEMA has reviewed this project and determined that this project constitutes a federal undertaking requiring a Section 106 review in accordance with the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA).

Project Location:

The project area is situated in the small agricultural Village of North Lewisburg in northeastern Champaign County at N40.22619 / W-83.55511. The proposed project location is situated at 77 East Street just south of Spain Creek, and approximately 300-feet north of the intersection with East Maple (State Route 275 & 559). Originally delineated as town lots 110 and 111, this area was part of Gowey's late 19th century addition to the Village.¹ The property is situated on the east side of East Street in a predominately residential neighborhood comprised of a mix of two story late 19th and early 20th century dwelling and open fields. The proposed site is approximately 0.89 acres.

Proposed Project:

The proposed project calls for the construction of a permanent storm resistant Community Support Center / Storm Shelter to provide a safe haven for the residents of North Lewisburg and the surrounding rural area in the event of severe weather or tornados. The proposed structure will be a single story masonry structure approximately 40-foot wide and 60-foot in length with a below grade safe room.

Area of Potential Effect (APE):

The Area of Potential Effect (APE) is defined under 36 CFR §800.16 (d) as the geographic area or areas within which an undertaking may directly or indirectly cause changes in the character or use of historic properties, if any such properties exist. The regulations also acknowledge that the APE is influenced by the scale and nature of an undertaking and may be different for different kinds of effects caused by an undertaking. Pursuant to 36 CFR §800.4(a)(1) FEMA has determined that the APE for this undertaking is the property at 77 East Street and the immediate adjacent environs. FEMA will also take into account any historic buildings or structures in the immediate adjacent area.

Previous Project Information:

In accordance with section 800.4(b)(1) FEMA has conducted its own review of the existing data. Based on information on the Ohio SHPO online database and the National Register's online database no known historic structures or archaeological sites were identified in the project area.

Seven previously identified prehistoric sites and two historic sites were noted in the area to the northeast of the project area (See Figure 4 Appendix A). Prehistoric sites identified include; 33CH042, 33CH044, 33CH047, 33CH048, 33CH049, 33CH050 and 33CH051. Historic sites include 33C042 and 33CHO43.

Additionally, six possible historic properties were identified in the surrounding area that include;


History Overview:

The proposed site of the community and emergency facility is to be located on the site previously occupied by the North Lewisburg High School at 77 East Street. Built in 1915, North Lewisburg High School building was a two story, hip-roofed, rectangular planed brick structure. The principal façade is symmetrical consisting of a central semi-projecting two-story pavilion with a semi-circular shallow arched parapet. At the ground floor is the principal entry, which consisted of glass and wood panel double doors with fan lights. Flanking the central pavilion and defining the building's corners are two-story projecting bays with stepped parapet. A two-story, undecorated masonry section connects the central pavilion and end bays. The fenestration consisted of elongated wooden sash windows. Fenestration in the central pavilion consists of a Palladian window above the front entry. On the rear façade was a two-story brick auditorium and gymnasium.




View of the 1915 North Lewisburg High School, note how the first floor appears to be below grade.

As part of historic review process, FEMA has consulted the Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps for North Lewisburg. The earliest map to include the project area is the 1895 Map. This map shows the area along East Street as being sparsely populated with a mix of small residential dwellings and commercial buildings. The principal commercial area of the Village was developing near the intersection of East Maple and Sycamore Streets. A single small rectangular frame structure appears on one of the two town lots on which the Village is proposing to erect the Storm Shelter / Community Support Center. Based on Starr and Headington's 1874 Atlas of Crawford County, this structure was identified as the residence of H. Sigler. The structure also appears on the 1901 Sanborn Map.




1898 Sanborn Insurance Map showing the proposed project area.

In 1915, the Village constructed its new high school on town lots 110 and 111. The next available Sanborn Fire Insurance Map (1926) shows a large rectangular two-story masonry school with a rear addition on the property. The Sigler residence no longer appears and was demolished prior to 1915.

The last available Sanborn Map is the 1950 Map. This map shows the school extending across the majority of Lots 110 and 111. Built in 1915, the school remained at this location until the mid 1980's when the school was razed. The lots have remained vacant since the 1980's removal of the school and are today open green space. In 1994 a Veteran's Memorial was constructed in the southwest corner of the project area and will not be impacted by the proposed project.

Summary and Determination:

In accordance with the National Historic Preservation Act, FEMA has determined that this project constitutes a federally assisted undertaking, requiring section 106 review. Part of the historical review process required a historical, architectural and archaeological assessment be undertaken on the site of the proposed North Lewisburg Community Support Center/Storm Shelter. Additionally FEMA reviewed seven (7) potentially historic structures identified in an earlier survey.

FEMA has reviewed this project and in accordance with 36 CFR §800.4(d)(1), has made a determination of "No Historic Properties Affected" for the Village of North Lewisburg Community Support Center/Storm Shelter. FEMA seeks concurrence of these findings from the Ohio Historic Preservation Office.

This determination is in part based on the fact that under National Register Criterion A, no local or national events that have made a significant contribution to our history were found. Under Criterion B, no association with any individual of national significance was found. Under Criterion C, the surveyed buildings were found to lack architectural integrity, were extensively altered and no longer retain a sense of feeling or place necessary for inclusion in the National Register.

Under criteria D, archaeological resources, two important criteria must both be met to qualify a property for inclusion in the National Register.

- The property must have, or have had, information to contribute to our understanding of human history or prehistory, and
- The information must be considered important.

FEMA has evaluated the proposed undertaking and determined that the construction of the emergency facility will not adversely impact any potentially eligible buried cultural resources. This determination is in part based on the fact that the 1915 school extended across the majority of the project area and that any prehistoric or early American buried cultural resources, if present would have been destroyed during the construction or demolition of the school. No visible foundations associated with the school are visible today and the excavation of an early 20th century school does not meet the criteria set forth in Criterion D.

Post-Review Discoveries:

FEMA does not anticipate any post-review discoveries; however, FEMA wants to insure that any ground disturbing activities will not adversely impact any possible buried cultural resources. In accordance with 36 CFR §800.13, provisions are set forth to deal with unexpected discoveries that may be historically significant but were not identified as part of the initial review process.

Condition:

As part of the PDM approval process, FEMA will require OEMA to advise sub-grantees of the requirements of these conditions and Ohio laws regarding the discovery of human remains and will place documentation of this notification in the project file.

If human remains are discovered during the course of project implementation, OEMA will notify FEMA immediately and will require the sub-grantee to stop project activities in the vicinity of the discovery and take all reasonable measures to avoid or minimize harm until FEMA concludes consultation with OHPO, OEMA, or if warranted, other consulting parties and the applicant. The parties will consult to determine the appropriate treatment and disposition of the remains in accordance with the provisions of the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA), PL 101-601, and/or state laws, as applicable.




