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nongovernmental teams, increase visibility of medical supply chains and develop proposed common operating picture/technology solutions.

The United States must remain strategically poised to respond to major, complex catastrophic events, including threats of terrorism, naturally occurring disasters such as hurricanes, earthquakes and pandemics, as well as major industrial accidents, such as the Deep Water Horizon Gulf Oil Spill. The National Preparedness Leadership Initiative (NPLI), a joint program of the Harvard School of Public Health and the Harvard Kennedy School of Government developed and designed the Meta-Leadership strategy to build the connectivity of effort necessary to confront these challenges.
