



The Area of Potential Effect for the project is bound by the northeast corner of the intersection of Pinon Hills Boulevard and College Boulevard, directly west of Piedra Vista High School, and approximately 2.4 miles upstream along the Porter Arroyo from the Animas River. This proposed site for the Detention Facility is north of the residential and commercial properties that typically receive flood damages when a storm event occurs in this area. The project includes the construction of an earthen berm to control the storm water flow rate of the Porter Arroyo. The detention facility will be designed to detain the runoff generated by a 100-year storm within the Porter Arroyo drainage system.

Construction will include the excavation and grading of the basin, construction and grading of the perimeter berm, construction of intake and outfall structures, installation of rip rap for stabilization and erosion control, and seeding and fencing of the detention area. Some minor relocations of existing gas lines may be required, and extensions of existing sanitary sewer lines are also part of the project. Additionally, a service road entering from College Boulevard will be constructed to provide access to

the site. The entire project site is approximately 40 acres. Ground disturbing activities are estimated to be less than 10 acres within the 40 acre site.

A cultural records file search in the Archaeological Records Management Section (ARMS) of the New Mexico State Historic Preservation Division (HPD) through the New Mexico Department of Cultural Affairs, New Mexico State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO), was conducted for known archaeological sites. A review of the archeological data in ARMS indicates that the Area of Potential Effect was surveyed for archaeology by Western Cultural Resource Management, Inc., in 1996, and there are no sites located on, or directly adjacent to the project area, and after testing, no additional surveying was recommended for the closest site to the project area, LA 113650. Therefore, based on information gathered through this review process, FEMA has determined that **No Historic Properties Affected** as a result of the proposed undertaking and is submitting this undertaking to you for your review and comment. FEMA requests your comments within 30 days from receipt of this letter.
