




FEMA Public Assistance Recovery DR-1791-TX Weekly Update *(January 17, 2009)*

Note: All obligated dollars on this chart depict emergency work (debris removal and emergency protective measures – Categories “A” and “B”) and permanent work (categories “C” through “G”). FEMA, the State and local governments have completed all of the Preliminary Damage Assessments (**50 total**). **1,268** kick-off meetings (**80%**) have been conducted.

To date, a total of **1,978** Project Worksheets have been written for DR-1791; **1,075** Project Worksheets have been obligated.

The following are examples of new projects that have been deemed eligible over this past week:

- \$2,991,024.34 was obligated on 01/10/2009 to the City of Liberty for Category A work
- \$2,450,621.08 was obligated on 01/10/2009 to Brazoria County for Category A work
- \$529,971.00 was obligated on 01/12/2009 to the Department of State Health Services for Category B work

In addition, **89%** of Hurricane Ike debris (**20,299,399 cubic yards**) has been removed throughout Texas. An estimated **3,126,639 cubic yards** remain to be collected.

FEMA and the State work as partners to deliver the Public Assistance Program. The State, in its role as the grantee, has the ability to advance funding to subgrantees as appropriate. Because federal funding provided by the PA program is supplementary, an appropriate sharing of costs usually must occur. Normally, FEMA provides 75 percent of the cost of eligible disaster-related work; the remaining 25 percent is paid by the State and/or local applicants as determined by the State. As declared by the President, the federal share for debris removal and emergency protective measures for Hurricane Ike was increased to 100 percent federal funding for a period of 44 days retroactive to the date of the major disaster declaration. An additional amendment has been approved to extend 100 percent reimbursement for Category “A” for an additional 6 months ending on April 26, 2009.
