WASHINGTON — The whole-of-America response to fighting the COVID-19 pandemic continued today, as medical supplies arrived in Chicago via FEMA's Project Airbridge, for distribution to hard-hit areas around the country. NATO ally Turkey donated other much needed supplies, such as gloves, goggles and hand sanitizer to support America's fight against the virus.

Meanwhile, FEMA continues to expedite movement of commercially pre-sourced and procured critical supplies from the global market to medical distributors in various locations across the U.S. through Project Airbridge.

As of April 28, Project Airbridge has completed 95 flights with an additional 22 scheduled or in transit. Six flights landed Tuesday, four in Chicago and two in Los Angeles. Five flights are scheduled to land today, two in Chicago, and one each in Baltimore, Los Angeles and New York.

Through Project Airbridge, the following supplies have been delivered from overseas manufacturers to the U.S. and into private sector supply chains from March 29 to April 28:

- More than 768,000 N-95 masks.
- More than 751 million gloves.
- More than 71.5 million surgical masks.
- More than 10 million surgical gowns.
- Nearly 2.1 million thermometers.
- More than 562,000 face shields.
- More than 195,000 coveralls.
