FEMA Awards \$1 Billion for Emergency Work in Florida

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – FEMA has provided more than \$1 billion to help the State of Florida and local communities with the cost of emergency response to Hurricanes <u>Milton</u>, <u>Helene</u> and <u>Debby</u>.

To date, FEMA's Public Assistance program has obligated \$608.6 million for Hurricane Milton, \$335.5 million for Hurricane Helene and \$102.2 million for Hurricane Debby. The money reimburses the state, local governments and certain nonprofit organizations for emergency protective measures and debris removal.

FEMA's <u>Public Assistance</u> program provides reimbursement to local and state government agencies for the costs of emergency response, debris removal and restoration of disaster damaged public facilities and infrastructure. Houses of worship and other nonprofit organizations may also be eligible for FEMA Public Assistance.
