FY 2022 Fire Prevention and Safety Program

The Fiscal Year (FY) 2022 Fire Prevention and Safety (FP&S) Program will make \$36 million directly available to fire departments and non-profit organizations to strengthen community fire prevention programs and to support scientific research on innovations that improve firefighter safety, health, and well-being.

Overview

The FY 2022 FP&S Grant Program is one of three grant programs that constitute the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) focus on enhancing the safety of the public and firefighters with respect to fire and fire-related hazards. Since FY 2002, the FP&S Program has awarded approximately \$816 million in grant funding to provide critically needed resources to strengthen community fire prevention programs and enable scientific research on innovations that improve firefighter safety, health, and well-being. The FY 2022 FP&S Program will award another \$36 million to an estimated 100 eligible fire departments, national, regional, state, local, tribal, and non-profit organizations such as academic (e.g., universities), public health, occupational health, and injury prevention institutions for fire prevention programs and supporting firefighter health and safety research and development such as clinical studies that address behavioral, social science, and cultural research. Purpose

The purpose of the FP&S Program is to provide critically needed resources to fire departments and non-profit organizations to carry out fire prevention education and training, fire code enforcement, fire/arson investigation, firefighter safety and health programming, strategic national projects, prevention efforts, and research and development. Using a competitive process that is informed by fire service subject-matter experts, grants are awarded to applicants whose requests best address the priorities of the FP&S Program.



Funding

The Department of Homeland Security Appropriations Act, 2022 (Pub. L. No. 117-103) appropriated a total of \$36 million¹ to carry out the activities of the FP&S Program. The statute, 15 U.S.C. § 2229, authorized the FP&S Program to make competitive awards to fire departments and national, state, local, tribal, or nonprofit organizations that are not fire departments and that are recognized for their experience and expertise with respect to fire prevention or fire safety programs and activities, and firefighter research and development programs.

Eligibility

Eligible applicants for the FY 2022 FP&S Program include fire departments and national, state, local, tribal, and non-profit interest organizations, such as academic (e.g., universities), public health, occupational health and injury prevention institutions operating in any of the 50 states, as well as fire departments in the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, the U.S. Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico,² or any federally recognized Indian tribe or tribal organization. Definitions

- A fire department is an agency or organization having a formally recognized arrangement with a state, local, tribal, or territorial authority (city, county, parish, fire district, township, town, village, or other governing body) to provide fire suppression an a first-due basis to a fixed geographical area.
- A national, regional, state, local, tribal, or non-profit interest organization is an organization that is recognized for their experience and expertise in fire prevention and safety programs.

Program Highlights

Under the FY 2022 FP&S Program, eligible organizations may apply for grants under the following activities:

FP&S Activity

- Community Risk Reduction
 - Smoke Alarms, including addressing the needs of the disabled in the community (e.g., deaf/hard of hearing smoke alarms)
 - Sprinkler Awareness
 - Public Education
 - Training
 - General Prevention/Awareness

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¹ The funding for the FP&S Program is through the Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG) Program. In FY 2021, \$460 million was appropriated for the AFG Program; from this appropriation, \$46 million is allocated to the FY 2021 FP&S Program.

² The District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, the U.S. Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, and the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico are all defined as "States" in the Federal Fire Prevention and Control Act of 1974.

Application Process and Evaluation Criteria

All complete and eligible applications are evaluated through a peer review panel process. Peer reviewers will assess the merits of each project within the application based on the substance of the application relative to the established funding priorities. A minimum of three peer review panelists will evaluate the applications using the Narrative Statement, answers to general questions, and answers to activity-specific questions. Each application is judged on its merits against established criteria and is not compared to other applications. The funding priorities differ for the FP&S Activity and the R&D Activity. The funding priorities and evaluation criteria are developed from recommendations provided by a criteria development panel composed of fire service professionals representing the major fire service organizations.

FP&S Activity

 Projects most consistent with the established FP&S Program funding priorities that score the highest and are determined to be in the "competitive range" will undergo a Technical Review by the FEMA Program Office, which will assess the request with respect to costs, quantities, feasibility, eligibility, and recipient responsibility.

R&D Activity

- Applications are first reviewed by a panel of fire service experts to assess the need for the research results and the likelihood that the results would be implemented by the fire service in the United States.
- Projects that are determined most likely to be implemented to enable improvement in firefighter safety, health, or well-being will be deemed in the "competitive range" and will be forwarded to a second level of project review, which is the scientific panel review process.
