SUBJECT: Fiscal Year 2024 Notice of Funding Opportunity for FEMA's

Shelter and Services Program – Allocated

Today, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), through the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), announced the availability of the Fiscal Year (FY) 2024 Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) for the Shelter and Services Program – Allocated (SSP-A). FY 2024 SSP-A provides \$300 million in federal awards to support the safe, orderly, and humane release of noncitizen migrants from short-term holding facilities. A total of \$275 million will be distributed in the first round, and the remaining \$25 million will be allocated later in the year accommodating evolving operational requirements. The SSP-A NOFO may be found online at http://www.fema.gov/grants and at http://www.grants.gov. A separate SSP – Competitive (SSP-C) NOFO for \$340.9 million was also released today.

The applicants identified in the allocation table titled *Section B.1 Available Funding* of the SSP-A NOFO are the only entities eligible to submit SSP-A Round 1 applications, including those applications submitted with eligible subapplicants.

Eligible applicants for SSP-A may apply for SSP-C awards.

Funding can be used for primary and secondary services as defined in the FY 2024 SSP-A NOFO. Below are some examples of eligible primary and secondary services:

Primary Services

- Shelter (e.g., cots, beds, linens, shelter utilities, maintenance, housekeeping)
- Food (e.g., food items, food banks, contracted meals, storage containers, cookware, utensils)
- Transportation (e.g., transportation from DHS facility to shelter and onward to a final destination)

• Acute Medical Care (e.g., basic first aid care and supplies, health screenings, overthe-counter medication)

Secondary Services

- Clothing: shirts, pants, outerwear, underwear and bras, socks, shoes/shoelaces, backpacks, belts, etc.
- Management and Administration (e.g., IT assistance, shelter management, language services)
- Renovations or modifications to existing facilities (e.g., temporary expansion, non-groundbreaking improvements, repairs)

If an eligible applicant does not apply for its full allocation or FEMA does not issue an award to an eligible applicant for other reasons, the Secretary of Homeland Security will reallocate the funding to account for rapidly changing trends and operational considerations. Reallocations will occur before the end of September 2024.

Applications for this program are processed through the FEMA Grants Outcomes (FEMA GO) system. To access the system, go to https://go.fema.gov/. Applications must be submitted no later than April 26, 2024, by 3 p.m. ET.

Applicants are strongly encouraged to begin the application process as soon as possible, including obtaining a Unique Entity Identifier (UEI) number. The UEI is a required application element and may take <u>up to four weeks to obtain</u>.

To apply for an award under this program, all applicants must:

- 1. Register for, update, or verify their SAM.gov account and ensure the account is active before starting the application in FEMA GO.
- 2. As a part of the SAM.gov registration, register, update, or verify a UEI. This number will be required in the application.
- 3. Apply for, update, or verify their Employer Identification Number (EIN) from the Internal Revenue Service.
- 4. Register in FEMA GO, add the organization to the system, provide a UEI number, and establish the Authorized Organizational Representative. The organization's electronic business point of contact (eBiz POC) from the SAM registration may need to be involved in this step. See the FEMA GO Startup Guide for step-by-step instructions.
- 5. Submit the complete application in FEMA GO. Information about FEMA GO is available at https://www.fema.gov/grants/guidance-tools/fema-go.
- 6. Maintain an active SAM.gov registration with current information at all times during which it has an active federal award, application, or plan under consideration by a federal awarding agency. As part of this, applicants must also provide information on an

applicant's immediate and highest-level owner and subsidiaries, as well as on all predecessors that have been awarded federal contracts or federal financial assistance within the past three years, if applicable.
