Key Differences in the Flood Mitigation Assistance Annual Grant Program and Swift Current Funding Opportunities

The Flood Mitigation Assistance program, including Swift Current, makes federal funds available to states, tribes, territories and local governments to reduce or eliminate the risk of repetitive flood damage to structures insured through the National Flood Insurance Program.

Key Differences

For fiscal year 2023, FEMA has two funding opportunities, one for Flood Mitigation Assistance and one Swift Current. For full details of both of these opportunities, visit <u>Grants.gov</u>.

<u>Swift Current</u> focuses on streamlining funding for Individual Flood Mitigation Projects after a major disaster declaration with flooding, whereas the competitive Flood Mitigation Assistance funding opportunity has a broader range of flood mitigation activities and projects.

The table provides a side-by-side comparison of the key distinctions between these two funding opportunities.
