OVERALL FUNCTION	The Public Health and Medical Shelter Support Team Leader coordinates all medical and public health activities for congregate shelters
COMPOSITION AND ORDERING SPECIFICATIONS	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. This position can be ordered as a single resource or in conjunction with a NIMS typed team (such as a Public Health and Medical Shelter Support Team) 2. Discuss logistics for this position, such as security, lodging, transportation and meals prior to deployment 3. The position typically works 12 hours per shift, is self-sustainable for 72 hours and is deployable for up to 14 days

Each type of resource builds on the qualifications of the type below it. For example, Type 1 qualifications include the qualifications in Type 2, plus an increase in capability. Type 1 is the highest qualification level.
